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Questionnaire

1.0 Introduction

Young peoples' views (under 18s) are not asked for their views in the National Place Survey (a cross section of residents in the District). To understand young peoples' points of view, a survey originally based on the National Best Value Satisfaction Survey was designed, with specific questions pertinent to young people added. By comparing directly with the previous young peoples surveys in 2004 and 2007/8, along with the 2008 Place Survey and the 2009 Warwickshire Partnership Survey, evaluation of the Council's policies and strategies can be done. Also by comparing with the adult population, we can see differences in attitudes to the service offered.

The survey also gives the Council valuable intelligence on the quality of life for young people, and to help improve the quality of services available.

2.0 Methodology

Questionnaires were distributed with the help of Warwickshire County Council (Children, Young People & Families Directorate) to pupils of Alcester High, Kineton High, Stratford High, Studley High, and Shipston High School. The survey took place between May and July 2010. 755 questionnaires were distributed into five schools who agreed to participate. 425 were completed and the responses received by school is shown in Table 1.

Pupils gave the completed questionnaires back to the teachers who batched them up and were collected by Stratford District Council.

All questions with "Don't Know" or "It does not apply" as an option have been taken out of the answer and recalculated, where appropriate.

3.0 Summary of Results

3.1 The Quality of Life in this Area

- Young people were asked to say what were the five most important things making somewhere a good place to live. The top five in the District were activities for teenagers; health services; the low level of crime; shopping facilities and clean streets.
- Respondents were asked to think about their local area and indicate up to five things that most need improving. The top five improvements were better/more job opportunities; more youth facilities; better public transport; improved leisure facilities; and affordable housing opportunities.
- 63% of those surveyed are satisfied with the local area as a place to live.

3.2 Youth Facilities

- Young residents were asked to think about the types of projects/activities they would like to see in a youth facility for 13-19 year olds. The top five responses were a place to relax with friends; chance to go on trips; sporting activities; access to the internet; and access to outdoor education.
- Young residents were asked what they felt a youth facility should be. The top five replies were somewhere to relax with your friends and chill out; somewhere to try out new things; somewhere to learn new skills; safe and supportive and somewhere to get support with problems.

3.3 Recreational Activities and Venues

- 21% of young residents use SDC's sports/leisure facilities and events at least once a week, a lower percentage than in both 2007/8 and 2004. The number of young people never using them has fallen by 4 percentage points from 11% in 2007/8 to 7% in 2010.
- 31% of young residents surveyed use parks and open spaces in the District at least once a week, an increase of 6 percentage points from that of 25% recorded in 2007/8. The number of young people never using them fell by 3 percentage points from 7% in 2007/8 to 4% in 2010.
- Over three fifths of young residents (62%) were satisfied with the sports/leisure facilities and events provided by the Council, a higher percentage (that of 3 percentage points more) than in 2007/8.
- Just under two thirds of young residents (66%) were satisfied with the parks and open spaces provided by the Council, an increase of 9 percentage points over the 57% recorded in 2007/8.

3.4 Changes in Quality of Life

- The top five services included in the survey that have improved in the last three years the most are; shopping facilities (better 33% against 17%); roads and pavement repairs (better 30% against 25% worse); sport and leisure facilities (better 30% against 14% worse); health services (better 25% against 16% worse); and education provision (better 24% against 12%).

3.5 Anti-Social Behaviour

- Almost three-fifths of young residents (58%) felt rubbish and litter lying around is a very or fairly big problem. This represented a slight decrease of 1 percentage point compared to the 59% recorded in the 2007/2008 survey. Interestingly however, it represents a significant percentage points' difference, that of 37 percentage points, when compared to the findings of the Warwickshire Partnership survey in 2009 when all residents, not just young people, were surveyed.
- Just under half (48%) of young people also felt that vandalism, graffiti and other deliberate damage to property or vehicles are a very or fairly big problem. This had fallen by 11 percentage points from that of 59% recorded in 2007/08. However, it is still noticeably higher, by 31 percentage points, than the 17% recorded by all residents in 2009.
- Similarly, just under half (48%) of the young surveyed thought people using or dealing drugs are a very or fairly big problem, a decrease of 6 percentage points from what young people thought in the earlier survey of 2007/8, yet still considerably higher (31 percentage points more) than the 17% of all residents thinking likewise in 2009.
- That same percentage of young people (48%) felt people being drunk/rowdy are a very or fairly big problem, a slight decrease of 1 percentage point from that of 49% recorded in 2007/8, but still significantly higher, by 33 percentage points, from the 15% recorded by all residents in 2009.
- 45% of the young surveyed thought teenagers hanging around the streets are a very or fairly big problem, and exactly half of those young people surveyed 2007/8, compared to exactly a quarter of all residents surveyed in 2009, felt teenagers hanging around the streets are a very or fairly big problem.
- Over three quarters of the young people surveyed felt abandoned or burnt out cars are not a very big problem or not a problem at all. 22% of young people in 2010 felt it was a very or fairly big problem, as did the same percentage of young people in 2007/8, however, just 3% of all residents in 2009 felt likewise.

3.6 Community Safety

- Asked how safe or unsafe young residents felt after dark in Stratford District, 36% felt safe with 24% feeling unsafe. Compared to in 2007/8 when 39% felt safe and 33% felt unsafe. This is a 7 percentage points decrease than the 35% feeling safe in 2004.
- 78% of young residents in the Stratford District felt safe when outside during the day, compared to 2% that felt unsafe in the District. This is a slight fall on 2007/8 and 2004, of 1 percentage point and 2 percentage points respectively.

3.7 Information about the Council and its Services

- Over three quarters of young residents (79%) felt not very well informed or not well informed at all about how they can get involved in local decision making and this figure has remained constant across both the 2010 and 2007/8 surveys.
- Just over a quarter of young residents (26%) claimed to be very or fairly well informed about how to complain to the Council, which represented a decrease of 6 percentage points over the 32% recorded in the 2007/8 survey.

- Over a quarter of young respondents (28%) indicated the local media is their main source to find out about SDC. This is slightly higher, by one percentage point, than the all residents figure (27%) from the 2009 Warwickshire Partnership Survey.
- Exactly a quarter of young respondents (25%) stated word of mouth is their main source to find out about SDC, which was 19 percentage points higher than the recorded 6% of all residents who stated this means.
- One in ten (9%) of young respondents found out about Stratford District Council through information provided by the Council, 18 percentage points less than when compared to 27% of all residents.
- 8% of young people claimed to have found out about SDC through social networking sites.
- Amongst young people, a higher number by 3 percentage points (13% versus 10% of all residents) do not know how to find out about SDC.

3.8 About the Respondents Area

- Exactly three quarters (75%) of young residents agree that the local area is a place where people from different backgrounds get on well together, 5 percentage points higher than the 2007/8 figure of 70%. Interestingly, however, findings from this latest survey were exactly the same as those in 2004, yet 6 percentage points lower than that of all residents (81% in the Warwickshire Partnership Survey of 2009).
- 70% of young residents feel very strongly or fairly strongly, that they belong to their neighbourhood, which represents an increase of 2 percentage points from the 68% recorded in 2007/08. This is also an improvement of 5 percentage points from the 2004 survey (65%) but still less than the all residents' survey (80%).
- Over two thirds (68%) of young respondents feel very strongly or fairly strongly, that they belong to their village or town. This is 3 percentage points higher than the 65% recorded in both the 2007/08 and 2004 surveys but is 10 percentage points below the all residents' result of 78%.
- 66% of young residents feel not very strongly or not at all strongly about belonging to the Stratford District Council area, 1 percentage point less than the 67% in 2007/08. This is higher than both the 2004 survey (63%) and the all resident's survey (53%).
- Over half (54%) of young residents disagree that they feel not very strongly or not at all strongly about belonging to the Warwickshire area, 3 percentage points higher than in 2007/08, and 8 percentage points higher than in 2004.
- 40% of young residents disagree that they feel they can influence decisions that affect their local area, compared to just over one quarter (27%) that agree. This compares to 47% disagreement with the statement in the 2007/08 survey and less than one third of respondents (32%) in the 2004 survey. Significantly, however, 66% of all residents from the 2009 Warwickshire Partnership Survey tended to disagree or definitely disagreed with the statement, which represented a difference of 24 percentage points from the 40% of young people in 2010.

4.0 Results in Detail

4.1 The Quality of Life in this Area

Young people were asked to state what were the five most important things making where they lived a good place to live. The top five in the District were activities for teenagers; health services; the low level of crime; shopping facilities and clean streets. A total of 6 other reasons were given and these can be found in Appendix 1.

The survey then went on to ask young people what improvements could be put in place to make Stratford District a better place for young people in the future. The top five improvements were better/more job opportunities; more youth facilities; better public transport; improved leisure facilities; and affordable housing opportunities. The "other" results, 17 in total, are included in Appendix 2.

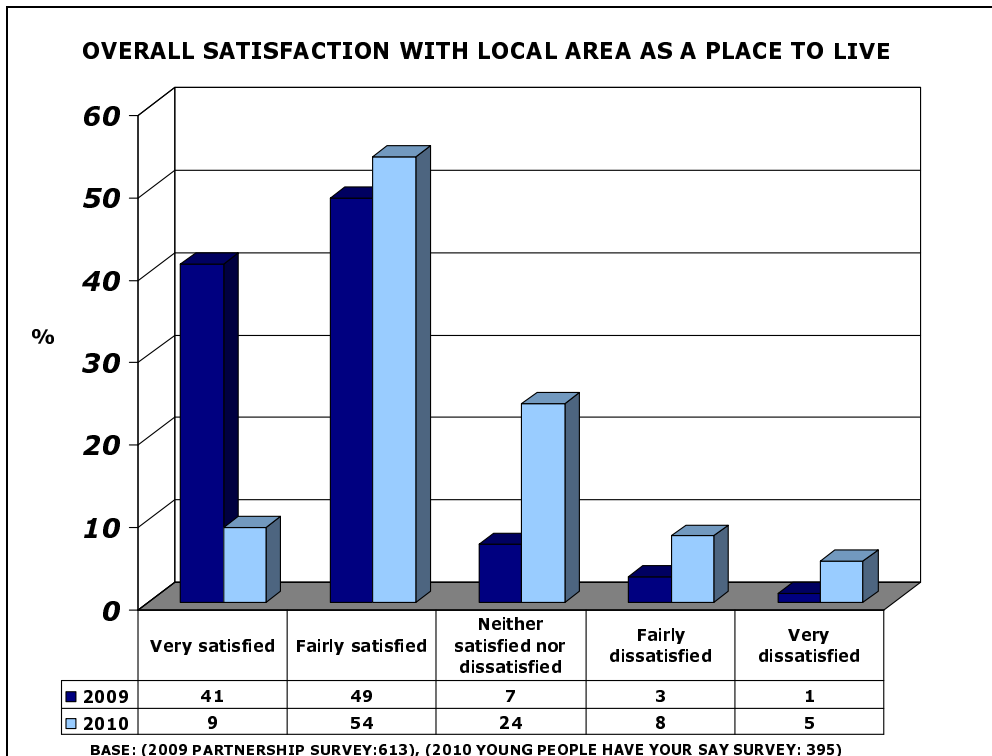
Looking at the percentage change compared with the 2007/8 survey, areas that have a higher improvement levels in 2010 compared with 2007/8 include better relations with police (+10.9%) and better / more job opportunities (+6.6%). Those areas showing a lower score compared with 2007/8 include better public transport (-9.6%) and improved leisure facilities (-7.7%).

63% of those young people surveyed in 2010 are satisfied with the local area as a place to live, as opposed to exactly nine in ten (90%) of all residents surveyed in 2009.

4.2 Youth Facilities

Types of projects/activities

Young residents were asked to think about the types of projects/activities they would like to see in a youth facility for 13-19 year olds. The top five responses were a place to relax with friends; sporting activities; chance to go on trips; access to the internet; and access to outdoor education. The "other" results, totalling 12, are included in Appendix 3.

Looking at significant results:-

- 68% of male respondents as opposed to exactly one half of female respondents, would like to see *sporting activities* in a youth facility for 13-19 year olds.
- 65% of female respondents in contrast to exactly one half of male respondents would like a chance to *go on trips*.
- Over four fifths ((82%) of females versus 65% of males, would like a place to *relax with friends*.
- Almost a third of males (31%) compared to 18% of females would like to see *general games* in a youth facility for 13-19 year olds.
- Four in ten ((38%) of males as opposed to 9% of females wanted access to *computer games*.
- 16% of those aged 14, versus 2% of those aged 12, would like to see *volunteering opportunities* in a youth facility for 13-19 year olds.
- Almost three quarters (74%) of 12 year olds compared to 54% of 13 year olds, 53% of 15 year olds and 20% of 16 year olds, stated chance to *go on trips*.
- 44% of 11 year olds, 41% of 14 year olds, 30% of 13 year olds, and 28% of 15 year olds cited *basic recording studios* as opposed to 11% of 12 year olds citing likewise.

- 85% of 15 year olds in contrast to 69% of 13 year olds and 72% of 14 year olds said a place to *relax with friends*.
- 38% of 11 year olds, compared to 7% of 14 year olds and wanted *help with hobbies*.
- Over half (54%) of 14 year olds, as opposed to 35% of 13 year olds, stated *access to outdoor educations*, e.g. sailing, walking, climbing, etc.
- Exactly half of all those surveyed aged 12 and 31% of those aged 13 mentioned *access to computer games*, versus 13% of those aged 14.

What a youth facility should be

Young residents were asked what they felt a youth facility should be. The top five replies were somewhere to relax with your friends and chill out; somewhere to try out new things; somewhere to learn new skills; safe and supportive; and somewhere to get support with problems. Significantly, the top five replies were exactly the same across all three surveys from 2004 to 2010. The "other" results, numbering 20, are included in Appendix 4.

Overall, the 2010 results are very similar to those seen in 2007/8 except for "somewhere to learn new skills" which rose by 4 percentage points from 50% in 2007/8 to 54% in 2010 and "somewhere to get support with problems", which rose by 5 percentage points from 41% in 2007/8 to 46% in 2010.

Looking at significant results:-

- 59% of those aged 14 and 57% of those aged 12, in contrast to 37% of those aged 15, stated that a youth facility should be safe and supportive.
- 40% of 12 year olds in comparison with 21% of 13 year olds, said a youth facility should be led by young people.

4.3 Recreational Activities and Venues

Usage of Sports/Leisure Facilities and Events

21% of young residents use SDC's sports/leisure facilities and events at least once a week, a lower percentage than in both 2007/8 and 2004. The number of young people never using them has fallen by 4 percentage points from 11% in 2007/8 to 7% in 2010. However, in 2004 this figure stood at 6%. Compared with the adult population, 7% of young people have never used SDC's facilities versus 27% of the adult population.

Looking at significant results:-

- 24% of young residents aged 12 years say they use sports / leisure facilities and events almost every day compared to only 1% of respondents aged 13 years.
- 11% of those aged 13, and 9% of those aged 14, versus 4% of those aged 12, claimed to have used the sports / leisure facilities and events longer ago than one year.

Usage of Parks and Open Spaces

31% of young residents surveyed use parks and open spaces in the District at least once a week, an increase of 6 percentage points from that of 25% recorded in 2007/8 and 3 percentage points higher than the 28% recorded in 2004. The number of young people never using them fell by 3 percentage points from 7% in 2007/8 to 4% in 2010. Compared to the adult population, a greater percentage of young people make use of the parks and open spaces almost every day (21% versus 16% respectively) and at least once a week (31% versus 27% respectively).

Looking at significant results:-

- 30% of young residents aged 15 years say they use parks and open spaces almost every day compared to 11% of respondents aged 13 years.
- 48% of those aged 12 in contrast to 27% of those aged 13, use parks and open spaces at least once a week.
- 32% of 14 year olds versus 17% of 13 year olds use parks and open spaces about once a month.
- 10% of those aged 13 as opposed to 1% of those aged 14 and claim they never use parks and open spaces.

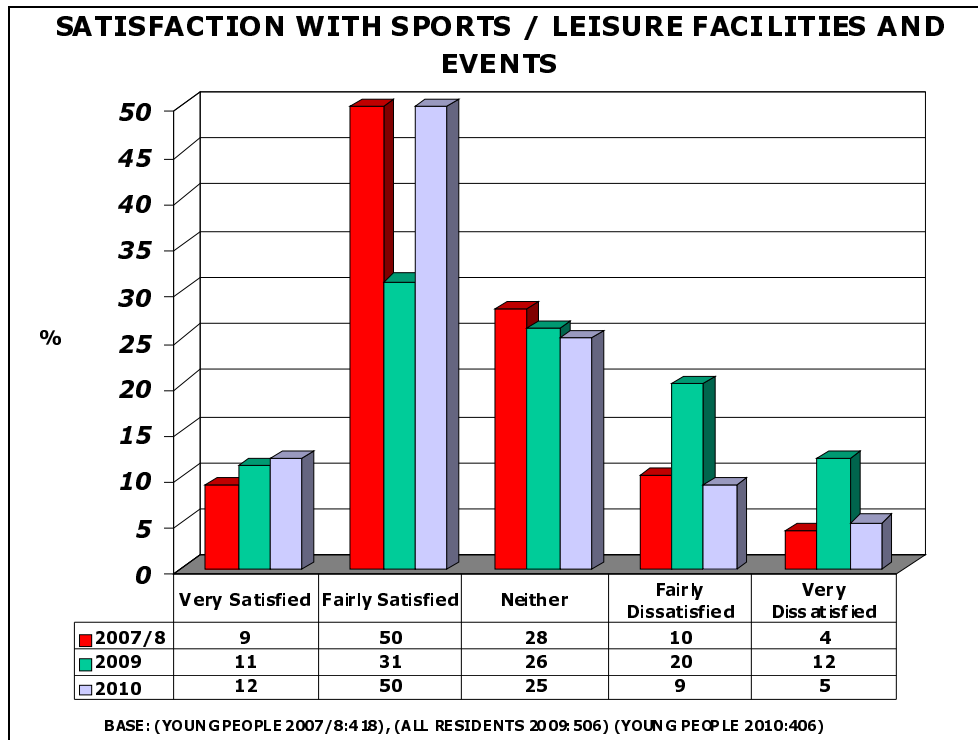

Satisfaction with Sports/Leisure Facilities and Events

Over three fifths of young residents (62%) were satisfied with the sports/leisure facilities and events provided by the Council, a higher percentage (that of 3 percentage points more) than the 59% recorded from young people surveyed in 2007/8. Interestingly, the 2010 satisfaction feedback was 20 percentage points higher than that of all residents in 2009 (42%).

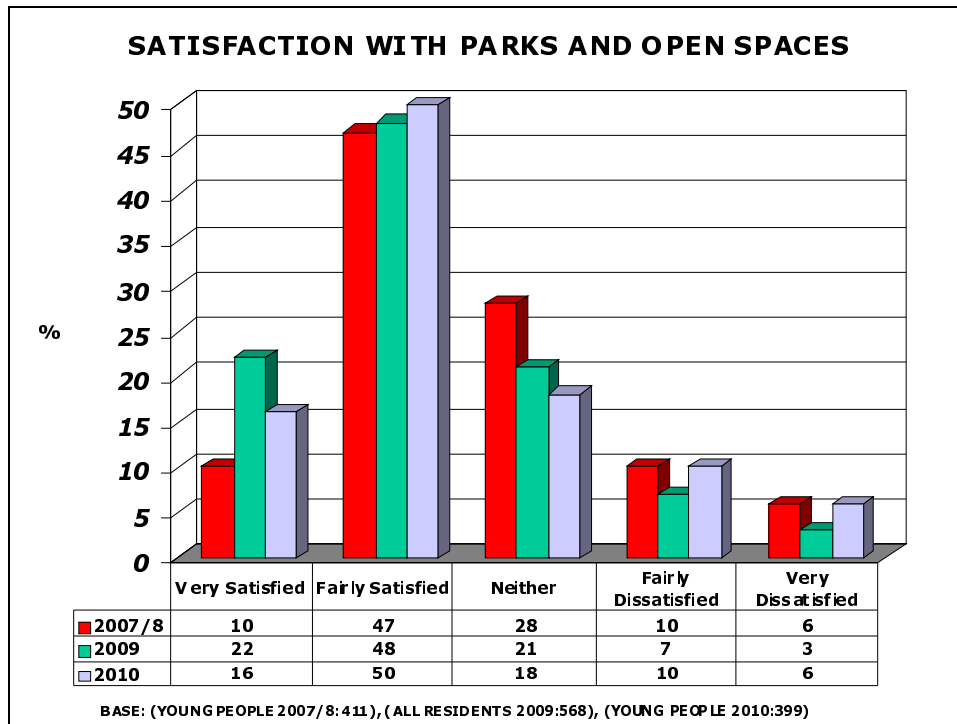


Satisfaction with Parks and Open Spaces

In 2010, just under two thirds of young residents (66%) were satisfied with the parks and open spaces provided by the Council, an increase of 9 percentage points over the 57% recorded by young residents in 2007/8. However, this figure was 4 percentage points less than the 70% satisfaction figure recorded by all residents in 2009.

16% of young respondents were dissatisfied with the parks and open spaces across both surveys compared to 10% of all residents in 2009. Hence it can be seen here that dissatisfaction levels amongst young people are higher.

4.4 Changes in Quality of Life

The top five services included in the survey that have improved the most are; shopping facilities (better 33% against 17%); roads and pavement repairs (better 30% against 25% worse); sport and leisure facilities (better 30% against 14% worse); health services (better 25% against 16% worse); and education provision (better 24% against 12%).

Those getting worse are affordable decent housing (40%), clean streets (35%) and activities for teenagers (32%). Also, significantly worse for young people are the levels of crime (38% worse), pollution (40%) and traffic congestion (44%).

Looking at significant results:-

- 45% of females as opposed to 31% of males believed *job prospects* had got worse over the last year.
- 32% of males compared to 22% of females thought *road and pavement repairs* had got worse.
- 15% of 12 and 13 year olds and 13% of 15 year olds versus 5% of 14 year olds stated *access to nature* had got better over the last year.
- For *activities for teenagers*, three in ten (30%) of those aged 12, versus 11% of those aged 15, claimed they had got better over the last year. However, 39% of 15 year olds as opposed to 16% of 13 year olds said it had got worse.
- So far as *clean streets* were concerned, 17% of 12 year olds and 15% of 15 year olds in contrast to 9% of 14 year olds, believed they had got better.
- In connection with *community activities*, 17% of 12 year olds stated they had got better versus 5% of 15 year olds. Almost a quarter (24%) of 15 year olds, compared to 5% of 13 year olds, claimed they had got worse.
- Over a third (36%) of 12 year olds as opposed to 13% of 14 year olds and 14% of 15 year olds cited *cultural facilities* had got better.
- Just over a quarter (26%) of those aged 12 and 13, compared to 11% of those aged 15 stated *facilities for young children* had got better. However, 18% of those aged 15 versus 3% of those aged 13, claimed they had got worse.
- 37% of 15 year olds said *job prospects* had got worse over the last year, in contrast to 11% of 13 year olds and 26% of 14 year olds.
- Regarding *race relations*, 14% of 13 year olds versus 6% of 15 year olds and 7% of 14 year olds, claimed they had got worse over the last year.
- Almost a third (32%) of 12 year olds, as opposed to 17% of 15 year olds, believed *sports and leisure facilities* had got better.
- 21% of 12 year olds compared to 8% of 14 year olds and 10% of 15 year olds stated *the level of crime* had got better over the last year.
- In respect to the level of *traffic congestion*, significantly, over half (53%) of those aged 15, versus 23% of those aged 14, claimed it had got worse.

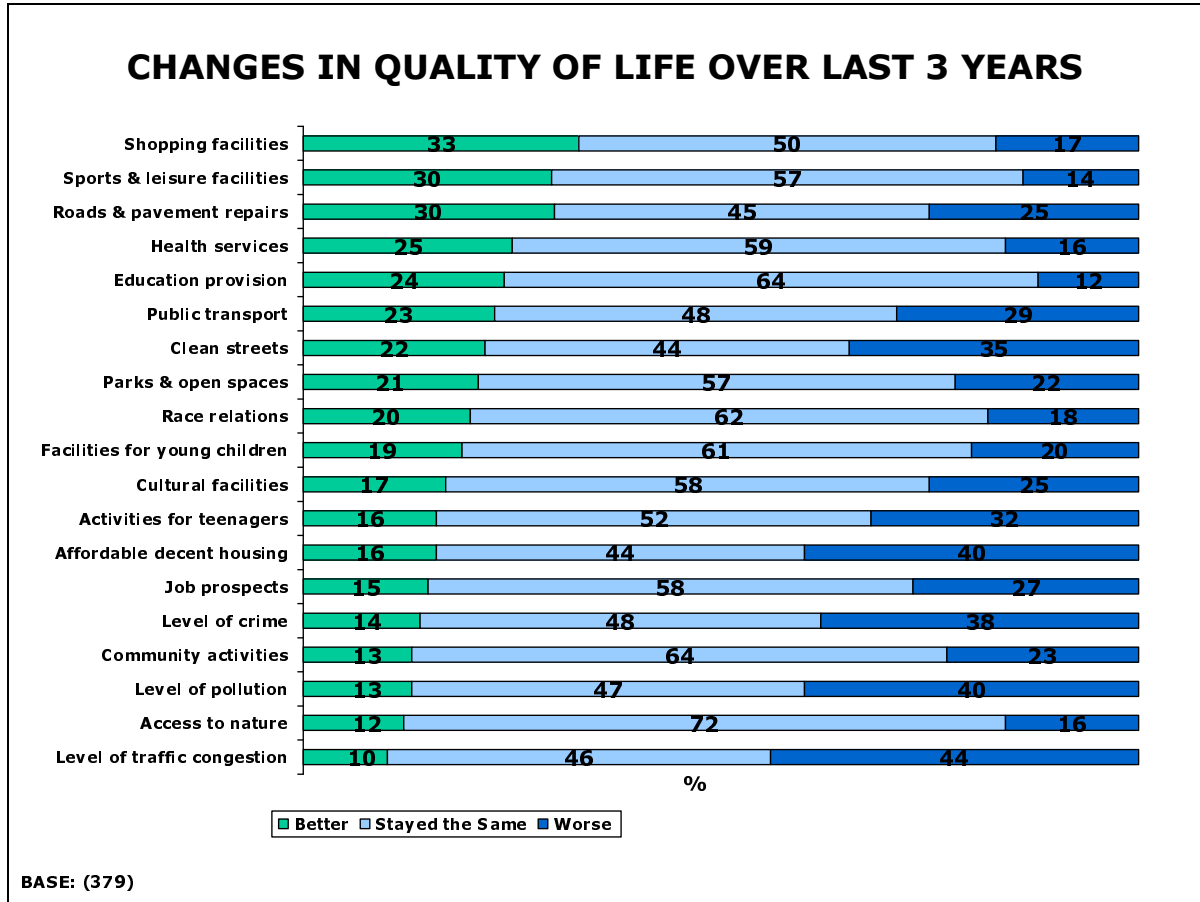

4.5 Anti Social Behaviour

Almost three fifths of young residents (58%) felt *rubbish and litter lying around* is a very or fairly big problem. This represented a slight decrease of 1 percentage point compared to the 59% recorded in the 2007/2008 survey. Interestingly however, it represents a significant percentage points' difference, that of 37 percentage points, when compared to the findings of the Warwickshire Partnership survey in 2009 when all residents, not just young people, were surveyed.

Just under half (48%) of young people in 2010 felt that *vandalism, graffiti and other deliberate damage to property or vehicles* are a very or fairly big problem. This had fallen by 11 percentage points from that of 59% recorded in 2007/08. However, it is still noticeably higher, by 31 percentage points, than the 17% recorded by all residents in 2009.

Similarly, just under half (48%) of the young surveyed in 2010 thought *people using or dealing drugs* are a very or fairly big problem, a decrease of 6 percentage points from what young people thought in the earlier survey of 2007/8, yet still considerably higher (31 percentage points more) than the 17% of all residents thinking likewise in 2009.

That same percentage of young people (48%) believed *people being drunk / rowdy in public* are a very or fairly big problem, a slight decrease of 1 percentage point from that of 49% recorded in 2007/8, but still significantly higher, by 33 percentage points, from the 15% recorded by all residents in 2009.

Interestingly, 45% of young people in 2010, and exactly half of those young people surveyed 2007/8, compared to exactly a quarter of all residents surveyed in 2009, felt *teenagers hanging around the streets* are a very or fairly big problem.

Over three quarters of the young people surveyed felt abandoned or burnt out cars are not a very big problem or not a problem at all. 22% of young people in 2010 felt it was a very or fairly big problem, as did the same percentage of young people in 2007/8, however, just 3% of all residents in 2009 felt likewise.

Looking at significant results:-

- Six in ten (59%) of those aged 15 versus 40% of those aged 12 said other *teenagers hanging around on the streets* were not a very big problem or not a problem at all.
- Over half (57%) of respondents aged 13 years and exactly half of 15 year olds felt *vandalism, graffiti and other deliberate damage to property or vehicles* were a very big or fairly big problem, as opposed to 43% of 14 year olds.
- Four in ten 13 year olds and 15 year olds (41% and 36% respectively) believed that *people being attacked because of their skin colour, ethnic origin or religion* was a very big or fairly big problem compared to 21% of those aged 14.
- Just under half (47%) of those aged 15 felt *people using or dealing drugs* was either not very big problem or not a problem at all, in contrast to 29% of 14 year olds and 30% of 13 year olds.
- Regarding *people sleeping rough on the streets or in other public places*, over half (56%) of those aged 15 and exactly a third of those aged 13 believe that it is a very big or fairly big problem, as opposed to 19% of those aged 12.

4.6 Community Safety

Feeling safe after dark

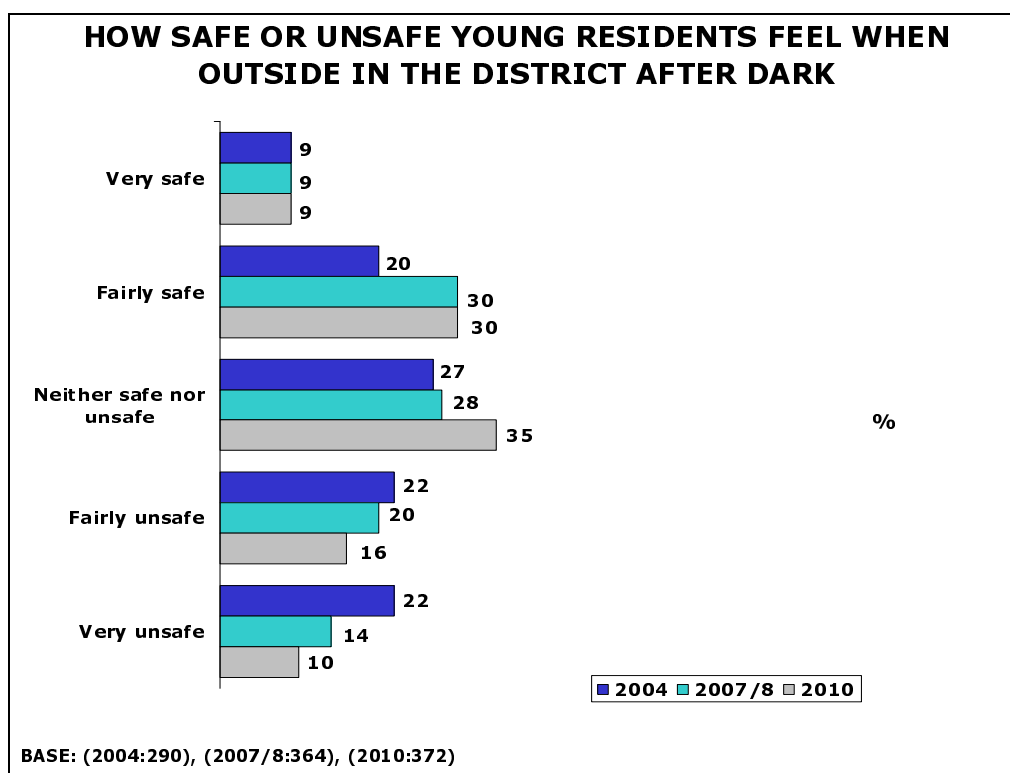
Asked how safe or unsafe young residents felt after dark in Stratford District, in 2010, 36% felt safe with 24% feeling unsafe, compared to in 2007/8 when 39% felt safe and 33% felt unsafe. This is a 7 percentage points decrease than the 35% feeling safe in 2004.

The 84 reasons given for answering "fairly unsafe" or "very unsafe" after dark are included in Appendix 5.

Looking at significant 2010 results:-

- Over half (52%) of 15 year olds, compared to 21% of 12 year olds, claimed to feel very or fairly safe when outside in the District after dark.

Feeling Safe During the Day

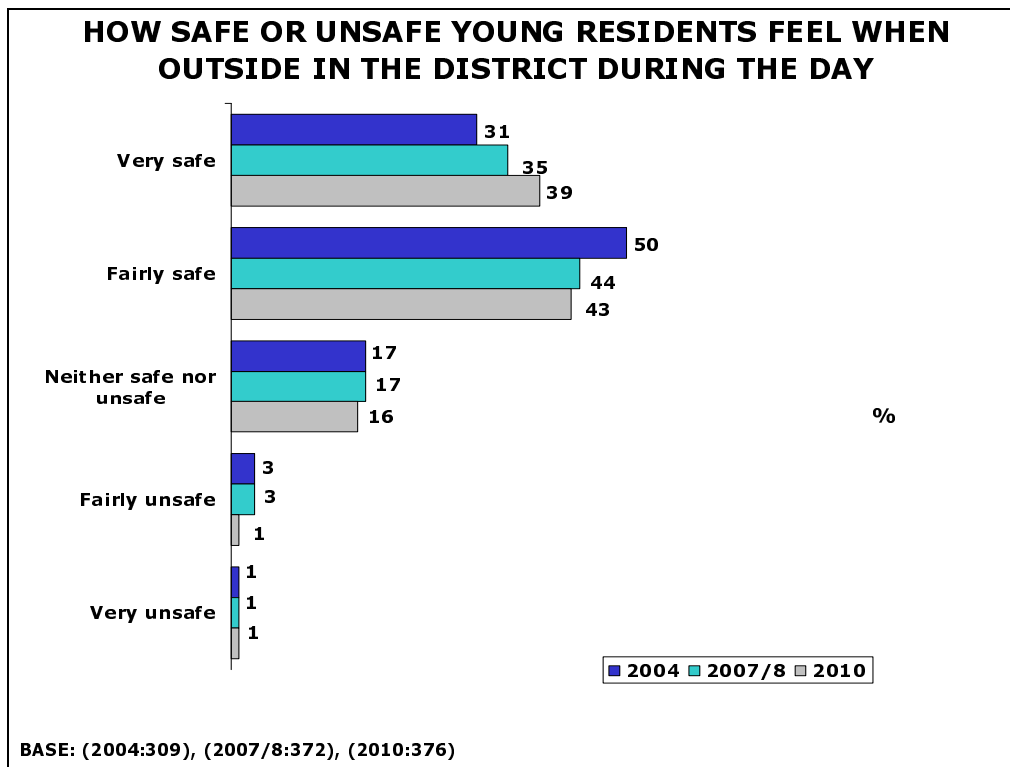
78% of young residents in Stratford District felt safe when outside during the day, compared to 2% that felt unsafe. This is a slight fall on 2007/8 and 2004, of 1 percentage point and 2 percentage points respectively.

The 4 reasons given by young people for answering “fairly unsafe” or “very unsafe” when outside in Stratford District during the day, are included in Appendix 6.

Looking at significant 2010 results:-

- 87% of females versus 79% of males feel fairly or very safe when outside in Stratford District during the day.

4.7 Information about the Council and its Services

How to get involved in local decision making

Over three quarters of young residents (79%) felt not very well informed or not well informed at all about how they can get involved in local decision making and this figure has remained constant across both surveys.

Over a quarter (27%) of 14 year olds versus 11% of 15 year olds, claimed to be very or fairly well informed on how they can get involved in local decision making.

How to complain to the Council

Just over a quarter (26%) of young people in 2010 claimed to be very or fairly well informed about how to complain to the Council, which represented a decrease of 6 percentage points over the 32% recorded in the 2007/8 survey.

Four in ten (37%) of 12 year olds, as opposed to 19% of 15 year olds, stated they felt very or fairly well informed about how to complain to the Council.

What the Council spends its money on

Less than a fifth (18%) of those young people surveyed in 2010 versus exactly a quarter (25%) of those surveyed in 2007/8, stated that they felt very or fairly well informed about what the Council spends its money on. This shows a decrease of 7 percentage points on those feeling well informed across the time period.

Almost a quarter (24%) of 14 year olds, in contrast to 11% of 12 year olds and 12% of 15 year olds, feel very or fairly well informed about what the Council spends it money on.

What the Council is doing to tackle anti-social behaviour

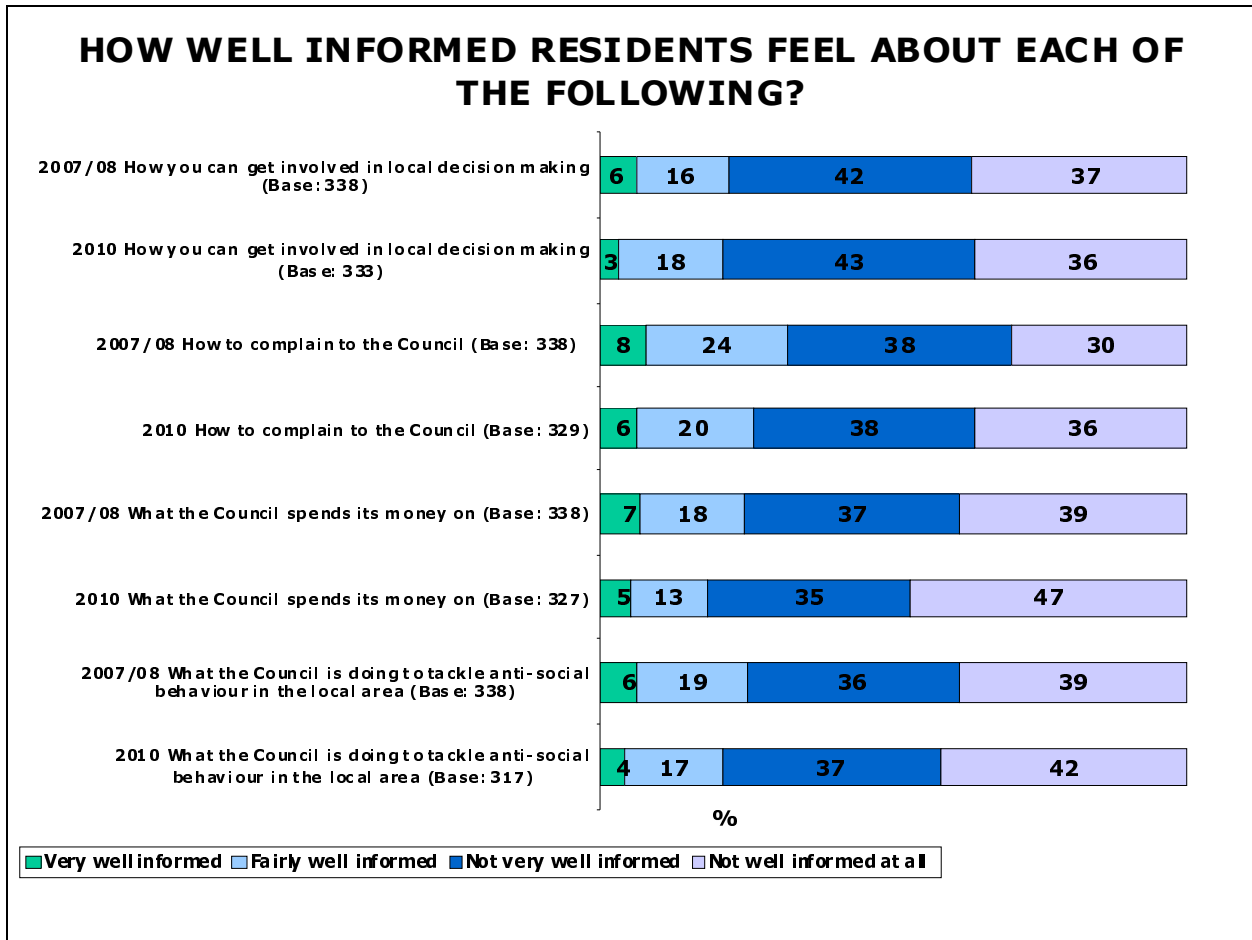
Just over a fifth (21%) of those surveyed in 2010 compared to exactly a quarter (25%) of young respondents feel informed about what the Council is doing to tackle anti-social behaviour in the local area, representing a decrease of 4 percentage points throughout the two surveys.

Over a third (36%) of 12 year olds, compared to 12% of 15 year olds, cited they were very or fairly well informed about what the Council is doing to tackle anti-social behaviour in their local area.

Where find out about SDC

Over a quarter of young respondents (28%) indicated the local media as their main source to find out about SDC. This is slightly higher, by one percentage point, than the all residents figure (27%) from the 2009 Warwickshire Partnership Survey.

Significantly, exactly a quarter (25%) of young people stated word of mouth, which was 19 percentage points higher than the recorded 6% of all residents who stated this means.

However, one in ten (9%) of young respondents found out about Stratford District Council through information provided by the Council, 18 percentage points less than when compared to 27% of all residents.

Interestingly, 8% of young people claimed to have found out about SDC through social networking sites: a means which had not been noted by all residents.

Amongst young people, a higher number by 3 percentage points (13% versus 10% of all residents) do not know how to find out about SDC.

4.8 About the Respondents Area

Whether different backgrounds get on well together

Exactly three quarters (75%) of young residents agree that the local area is a place where people from different backgrounds get on well together, 5 percentage points higher than the 2007/8 figure of 70%. Interestingly, however, findings from this latest survey were exactly the same as those in 2004, yet 6 percentage points lower than that of all residents (81% in the Warwickshire Partnership Survey of 2009).

Looking at significant 2010 results:-

- 82% of young female respondents definitely agree or tend to agree that the local area is a place where people from different backgrounds get on well together, compared to 69% of young male respondents.

Whether young people feel they belong to their local neighbourhood

70% of young residents feel very strongly or fairly strongly, that they belong to their *neighbourhood* which represents an increase of 2 percentage points from the 68% recorded in 2007/08. This is also an improvement of 5 percentage points from the 2004 survey (65%) but still less than the all residents' survey (80%).

Over two thirds (68%) of young respondents feel very strongly or fairly strongly, that they belong to their *village or town*. This is 3 percentage points higher than the 65% recorded in both the 2007/08 and 2004 surveys but is 10 percentage points below the all residents' result of 78%.

66% of young residents feel not very strongly or not at all strongly about belonging to the *Stratford District Council area*, 1 percentage point less than the 67% in 2007/08. This is higher than both the 2004 survey (63%) and the all residents' survey (53%).

Over half (54%) of young residents feel not very strongly or not at all strongly about belonging to the *Warwickshire area*, 3 percentage points higher than in 2007/08, and 8 percentage points higher than in 2004.

Looking at significant 2010 results:-

- 75% of young female respondents feel very strongly or fairly strongly, that they belong to their village or town, compared to 63% of young male respondents.
- Over a third (37%) of respondents aged 15 years feel very strongly or fairly strongly, that they belong to the Stratford District Council area. In comparison, 27% of respondents aged 12 years, felt likewise.

Whether young people feel they can influence decisions

Four in ten young residents (40%) disagree that they feel they can influence decisions that affect their local area, compared to just over one quarter (27%) that agree. This compares to 47% disagreement with the statement in the 2007/08 survey and less than one third of respondents (32%) in the 2004 survey. Significantly, however, 66% of all residents from the 2009 Warwickshire Partnership Survey tended to disagree or definitely disagreed with the statement, which represented a difference of 24 percentage points from the 40% of young people in 2010.

Looking at significant 2010 results:-

- 45% of respondents aged 15 years versus 37% of 13 year olds tend to disagree or strongly disagree that they can influence decisions affecting their local area.

- "There needs to be more places for teenagers and children to hang around where they aren't going to be complained about 24/7. We're part of the community as well and I feel restricted - youth cafe needed?"
- "I hold the opinion that the council needs to focus more on the roads and pavements in areas around the Banbury road, as I have noticed a very serious decline in quality. The camber on roads and pavements, particularly in my postcode make it very difficult to negotiate. This I feel needs some attention as there are many elderly people, young children and disabled people in the area. I feel the area has been neglected, and restricts what the disadvantaged residents can do, this is a serious issue that urgently needs addressing"
