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Executive Summary

A basic archaeological assessment has been undertaken of each of a series of sites proposed for inclusion in the Stratford on Avon Local Development Framework as potential development sites. The study has been commissioned by Stratford on Avon District Council. All relevant data held by the Historic Environment Record (HER) office has been consulted during the course of this assessment.

This document presents the results of that assessment, and includes:

- a summary of the state of archaeological knowledge about each site;
- the likely impact that the past uses of each site would have had on any archaeological deposits which previously survived;
- the potential for previously unknown archaeological sites to survive across each site;
- the Historic Environment Significance (including Historic Landscape Character) of each site and its sensitivity to change.

A preliminary archaeological planning recommendation is also made for each site. In a number of cases this includes a recommendation for more detailed study

Copies of the relevant HER and HLC data considered during the course of the assessment have been included, with maps, in the appendices to this report.

It should be noted that this is a basic level assessment of the archaeological potential of these sites, using only information held by the HER office. It is likely that further archaeological assessment of a wider range of sources would further inform the assessment of the archaeological implications of the proposed development of these sites. The archaeological planning recommendation may change, following the more detailed examination of individual sites. Moreover, additional information may be received by the HER office in future, altering our understanding of the archaeology of a particular area.

It should also be noted that the Warwickshire Historic Landscape Characterisation Project is an ongoing project due to finish at the end of 2008. As such, although all off the Proposed Strategic Sites are covered by characterisation, some of the analysis is limited and in progress. The summaries are general summaries of the historic landscape character of each area without any district wide or county wide analysis for comparison.

1. Methodology

Historic Environment Assessment

This assessment has considered the archaeological potential of the Proposed Strategic Sites (PSS), the likely impact of the past use of the sites on any archaeological deposits across the site and the likely impact of the proposed development of each of the sites upon any known, and/or unknown archaeological deposits which survive across each of the Proposed Strategic Sites. It has also considered the Historic Landscape Character (HLC) of each site, and this character's sensitivity to change.

Section 1 of this document presents the results of that assessment, and includes:

- a summary of the state of archaeological knowledge about each site;
- the likely impact that the past uses of each site would have had on any archaeological deposits which previously survived;
- the potential for previously unknown archaeological sites to survive across each site;
- the Historic Environment Significance of any such archaeological features and their sensitivity to change.
- The Historic Landscape Character of each site and this character's sensitivity to change.

An initial archaeological planning recommendation is also made for each site.

Appendix One contains the HLC data considered during the course of the assessment.

The archaeological assessment has been undertaken by archaeologists in the Information and Advice section of the Warwickshire Museum Field Services. All relevant data readily available to the Warwickshire Museum Field Services has been consulted during the course of this assessment. This primarily comprises the data held by the Historic Environment Record (HER) office, and includes:

- HER database records:
- HLC data held within the HER database.
- Historic, modern and geological maps;
- Modern and historic aerial photographs;
- Data on past archaeological planning recommendations held on the HER consultations module;
- 'Grey literature' reports on previous archaeological fieldwork undertaken within Warwickshire;
- Secondary sources.

It should be noted that the absence of known archaeological sites in the immediate vicinity of a proposed development site does not necessarily indicate an absence of archaeological potential. There are a number of reasons for archaeological sites not

having been previously identified across an area; for example, due to a previous lack of investigation, or an underlying geology or agricultural regime which hinders cropmark generation. Absence of evidence cannot therefore be taken as evidence of absence. The assessment of the archaeological potential of each site takes this into account.

It should be noted that this is a basic level assessment of the archaeological potential of these sites, using only information held by the HER office. It is likely that further archaeological assessment of a wider range of sources, for example records held by the County Record Office, aerial photographs held by the National Monuments Record, information on past disturbance across a site held by landowners, would further inform the assessment of the archaeological implications of the proposed development of these sites. The archaeological planning recommendation may change with the more detailed examination of individual sites. Moreover, additional information may be received by the HER office in future, increasing our understanding of the archaeology of a particular area.

The significance of hedges in respect of the Hedgerows Regulations 1997 has not been assessed here.

The planning recommendations have been drawn up within the context of the Planning Policy and Guidance (primarily PPG16 – Archaeology and Planning) currently applicable. New guidance, replacing PPGs 15 and 16, is due to be published, for implementation along with the Draft Heritage Projection Bill published in April 2008. Recommendations may require modification where appropriate in the light of the new regulatory framework.

HER Monument Record Selection

Appendix Two contains copies of selected HER monument records for known archaeological sites in the vicinity of each of the Proposed Strategic Sites, and maps showing their locations.

These HER maps and reports include all HER monuments within a 200m radius of each Proposed Strategic Site and any further HER monuments relevant to this archaeological assessment which lie within a 1km radius of these sites. A judgement on the relevance of each monument within a 1km radius of the site was made by the Warwickshire Museum Planning Archaeologist.

Information considered not relevant to the archaeological assessment includes monuments which were located away from the immediate vicinity of the Proposed Strategic Sites and that are known not to extend across the development site (e.g. a post-medieval park with a known boundary 400m away from the site), and lone findspots located a significant distance from the Proposed Strategic Sites. In addition, duplicated information, for example a record of a medieval building which lies within an area defined as being a known area of medieval settlement, has been removed from these datasets.

2. <u>Historic Environment Assessment.</u>

Caveat:

It should be noted that this is a basic level assessment of the archaeological potential of these sites, using only information held by the HER office. It is likely that further archaeological assessment of a wider range of sources, for example records held by the County Record office, aerial photographs held by the National Monuments Record, information on past disturbance across a site held by landowners, would further inform the assessment of the archaeological implications of the proposed development of these sites. The archaeological planning recommendation may change with the more detailed examination of individual sites. Moreover, additional information may be received by the HER office in future, increasing our understanding of the archaeology of a particular area.



Site size: 7.7ha

Geology: Keuper Marl

Past Disturbance:

Prior to the 19th century and later industrial development of this area, it is probable that this site was in agricultural use from at least the medieval period. Whilst this agricultural activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this activity is unlikely to have caused extensive damage.

The 19th century and later industrial development of this area is likely to have had a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived across this site. The later development of this area is also likely to have had an impact upon any industrial archaeology deposits associated with the earlier industrial development. The extent of this impact will have been dependent upon the groundworks associated with the construction works, e.g. building foundation design, extent of landscaping, services etc, information on which

is not presently available; however, this impact is likely to have been extensive across parts of this site.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

This site lies to the north west of the medieval town, and outside of the area shown as being occupied on Samuel Winter's map of 1759. The Stratford on Avon Canal was constructed across this site in the early 19th century, and the 1st Ed. OS map shows that a wharf has been constructed by at least 1886. An industrial area appears to have built up around this wharf, which included a brickworks and gasworks, both of which are both shown on the 1st Ed. OS map and lay within this site. This area was also served by a railway sidings, and associated good sheds, which had been constructed off the Stratford and Hatton branch line. These sidings partly extended across this site. Although the Canal Wharf has since been backfilled, this area has continued in industrial use until the present. There is a potential for archaeological deposits associated with this later post-medieval industrial activity to survive across this site. Any such deposits are likely to be of local interest.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

This area has had an industrial character for over 100 years.


Sensitivity to change:

The groundworks associated with the proposed development of this site would be likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which survive across this site.

A continuance of a commercial or industrial character would probably be best suited for this area.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Further archaeological assessment, in the form of a detailed desk-based assessment and walkover survey, should be undertaken of this site, primarily in order to identify any industrial remains of significance, either buried or extant. A report detailing the results of this assessment should be submitted with any application to redevelop this site. Dependent upon the conclusions of the desk-based assessment regarding the significance of any industrial archaeological deposits which may survive across the site, the previous ground disturbance across this site, and the nature and extent of the proposed development (including landscaping), further fieldwork may be necessary across those areas of the site which have not been subject to extensive past disturbance. This further fieldwork could be secured by a condition upon planning consent.



Site size: 2.7ha

Geology: 2nd Terrace River Gravels

Past Disturbance:

This Proposed Strategic Site lay within the medieval town of Stratford, and is known to have been occupied during the post-medieval and modern periods. This occupation is likely to have had a negative archaeological impact upon any earlier archaeological deposits which survived across the site. The extent of this prior disturbance is not presently known, however, fieldwork undertaken elsewhere in Stratford has demonstrated that, despite the long-term occupation of a site, it is possible for pockets of archaeological deposits to have survived; for example, at Bards Walk, Wood Street, archaeological fieldwork identified medieval features included a building and boundary ditch, despite this site having being occupied during the post-medieval and modern periods.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

This site lies within the medieval Borough of Stratford as laid out in 1196, and is shown as being occupied on Samuel Winter's map of 1759. A number of Grade II Listed buildings dating from the 15th century onwards survive within the site, along the Rother Street frontage. Despite the disturbance associated with the use of this area during the medieval, post-medieval, and modern periods, there is a potential for archaeological features associated with the development of Stratford upon Avon during the medieval and later periods to survive across this site. Any archaeological deposits present are likely to be of regional or local interest.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:


The historic landscape character of this area has been settlement from at least the early 18th century onwards.

Sensitivity to change:

The groundworks associated with the proposed development of this site would be likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which survive across this site. The redevelopment could also have an impact (negative or positive) upon the settings of the Grade II Listed Buildings which survive within this site.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Further archaeological assessment, in the form of a detailed desk-based assessment and walkover survey, should be undertaken of this site. A report detailing the results of this assessment should be submitted with any application to redevelop this site. Dependent upon the conclusions of the desk-based assessment regarding the previous ground disturbance across this site, and the nature and extent of the proposed development (including landscaping), further fieldwork may be necessary across those areas of the site which have not been subject to extensive past disturbance. This further fieldwork could be secured by a condition upon planning consent.



Site size: 9.9ha

Geology: Alluvium

Past Disturbance:

Prior to the development of this Proposed Strategic Site in the later 20th century, it is probable that this site was in agricultural use since at least the medieval period. Whilst this agricultural activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this damage is unlikely to have been extensive.

The 20th century development of this site is likely to have had a negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived this site. The extent of this impact will have been dependent upon the groundworks associated with the construction works, e.g. building foundation design, extent of landscaping, services etc, information on which is not presently available; however, this impact is likely to have been extensive across parts of this area.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

This Proposed Strategic Site lay outside the urban area of Stratford until its development in the later 20th century, and was probably in agricultural use from at

least the medieval period. There is a potential for archaeological deposits dating to the pre-medieval periods to survive across the site, however, even during these earlier periods any activity across this site is unlikely to have been intensive due to this site's tendency to flood. Any such deposits are likely to be of regional or local significance.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

The historic landscape character of this area is predominantly recent (post 1955) development.


Sensitivity to change:

The groundworks associated with the proposed development of this site would be likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which survive across this site.

The landscape character of this area is predominantly recent (post 1955) development and as such has already been significantly altered from its previous fieldscape character. The development of this site would not, therefore, have a significant impact upon the HLC of this area.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Further archaeological assessment, in the form of a detailed desk-based assessment and walkover survey, should be undertaken of this site. A report detailing the results of this assessment should be submitted with any application to redevelop this site. Dependent upon the conclusions of the desk-based assessment regarding the previous ground disturbance across this site, and the nature and extent of the proposed development (including landscaping), further fieldwork may be necessary across those areas of the site which have not been subject to extensive past disturbance. This further fieldwork could be secured by a condition upon planning consent.

This site lies within the medieval Borough of Stratford as laid out in 1196, and is shown as being occupied on Samuel Winter's map of 1759. Despite the disturbance associated with the use of this area during the medieval, post-medieval, and modern periods, there is a potential for archaeological features associated with the development of Stratford upon Avon during the medieval and later periods to survive across this site. Any such deposits are likely to be of regional or local interest.

The historic landscape character of this area has been settlement from at least the early 18th century onwards.


Sensitivity to change:

The groundworks associated with the proposed development of this site would be likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which survive across this site.

The historic landscape character of this area has been settlement from at least the early 18th century onwards. Presently this site is a small car park and coach terminal but housing would equally suit the character of this area.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Further archaeological assessment, in the form of a detailed desk-based assessment and walkover survey, should be undertaken of this site. A report detailing the results of this assessment should be submitted with any application to redevelop this site. Dependent upon the conclusions of the desk-based assessment regarding the previous ground disturbance across this site, and the nature and extent of the proposed development (including landscaping), further fieldwork may be necessary across those areas of the site which have not been subject to extensive past disturbance. This further fieldwork could be secured by a condition upon planning consent.



Site size: 17.2ha

Geology: Lower Lias, mainly clay

Past Disturbance:

It is probable that the site has been in agricultural use since at least the medieval period. Whilst this agricultural activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this damage is unlikely to have been extensive, other that the differential attrition caused by ridge and furrow cultivation.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

Although few archaeological sites have been previously recorded in the immediate vicinity of the site, evidence for prehistoric and Roman activity has been recorded from the wider area. The absence of known archaeological sites from the immediate vicinity of this site may be due to a lack of previous archaeological investigations across this area, rather than an absence of activity during the premedieval periods. There is therefore a potential for previously unknown archaeological deposits, pre-dating the medieval and later agricultural use of this site, to survive across this area. Any such deposits are likely to be of regional or local significance.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

Currently this area consists of large rectilinear 18th/19th century planned fields which form a group with similar character in the surrounding area. Ridge and furrow in this area shows the medieval agricultural use of this area and adds to the historic landscape character.

Sensitivity to change:

The groundworks associated with the proposed development of this site would be likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which survive across this site.

Any development will alter the historic landscape character of this area and have an effect on the surrounding character.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

A programme of archaeological evaluative fieldwork should be undertaken prior to the determination of any application to develop this site. Bishopton Lane along the west boundary of this site is identified in a charter of 1016 as Sealt Stret, one of the routes for the Droitwich salt production centre. Several presently undated linear features and enclosures are visible as cropmarks on aerial photographs 600m to the north west of this Proposed Strategic Site. 

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

Aerial photographs of this area show several cropmark complexes of undated linear features and enclosures within 800m to the north-east of this Proposed Strategic Site. Evidence for the Roman road of lies c.100m to the east of this development site. This fieldwork will also provide information useful for identifying potential options for minimising or avoiding damage to them. This fieldwork may identify archaeological deposits of regional or national importance, which may be worthy of preservation in situ. The availability of this information prior to the determination of any planning application submitted will enable an informed and reasonable planning decision to be reached, and the application modified if appropriate. Pre-determination fieldwork would not be necessary across those parts of the site which have been previously evaluated.



Site size: 4.4ha

Geology: 2nd Terrace River Gravels

Past Disturbance:

There is no evidence available at this time to this office that suggests that this site has been used for anything other than agriculture from at least the medieval period, and as orchards and allotments during the 20th century. Whilst the agricultural activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this damage is unlikely to have been extensive. The intensity of the tree planting which has previously taken place across this site across this site is not known, this may have had a significant localised impact across parts of the development site.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

A prehistoric ditch has been recorded c.360m to the south of this site, and a probable ring ditch and a cropmark complex, which includes enclosures and linear features, lies within 450m of the site. Further cropmarks suggestive of prehistoric activity are known from within 800m of the site. There is therefore a potential for previously unknown features dating to the prehistoric periods to survive across this Proposed Strategic site. A number of Roman finds have been recovered from the vicinity of the site, a Roman guarry has been recorded c. 360m to the south of this Proposed Strategic Site, and Roman burials c.420m to the south. These are likely to be associated with the extensive Roman settlement which is located c500m southeast of this site, along the line of the Roman road, Ryknield Street which runs north south through Bidford, c.370m to the east of this Proposed Strategic Site. Although the main focus of the Roman settlement lies to the south of this site, there is a potential for previously unknown archaeological features associated with the use of this area during the Roman period to survive within the development site. A large Anglo-Saxon cemetery lies c.360m to the south of this site. Over 200 burials have been associated with this cemetery; however, the nearest direct evidence for Anglo-Saxon settlement in this area was recorded to the north-west, at Broom. The extent of chance finds of Anglo-Saxon material from the vicinity of Bidford has led to the suggestion that a 'productive site' (a term denoting a site associated with industry, trade and exchange) may lie somewhere in the vicinity; on the basis of current evidence such a site would be unique within Warwickshire. There is therefore a potential for archaeological deposits associated with the use of this area during the Anglo-Saxon period to survive across the Proposed Strategic Site. As this site was likely to have been in agricultural use from at least the medieval period, any archaeological features present across the site are likely to pre-date the medieval period. Any such archaeological deposits are likely to be of regional or local importance, however, should evidence for Anglo-Saxon occupation be identified across this site these remains may of national significance if associated with the known cemetery site.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

There are two distinct parts to this site. The first to the east forms part of a very large post Second World War field. This field has been amalgamated from small irregular and rectilinear fields with straight and curvilinear boundaries, with some dog-leg and reverse 'S' boundaries, probably formed as a result of piecemeal enclosure (16th-18th century). The second part of this site to the west appears to form part of the gardens associated with the predominantly post 1900/pre 1955 detached housing along Westholme Road. This whole site is marked as orchards and allotments on the OS 1955 edition maps. The historic landscape character has changed a number of times in the last century.


Sensitivity to change:

The groundworks associated with the proposed residential development of this site would be likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which survive across this site.

The historic landscape character for this area has changed a number of times already in the last century. The development of this site would not, therefore, have a significant impact upon the HLC of this area.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Further archaeological assessment, the first phase of which would comprise detailed desk-based assessment, should be undertaken of this site. It will be necessary for archaeological evaluative fieldwork to be undertaken prior to the determination of any application to develop this site. This fieldwork will help to establish the presence or absence of archaeological remains or artefacts across the site, and, if present, their character, extent and state of preservation. This fieldwork will also provide information useful for identifying potential options for minimising or avoiding damage to them. This fieldwork may identify archaeological deposits of regional or national importance, which may be worthy of preservation in situ. The availability of this information prior to the determination of any planning application submitted will enable an informed and reasonable planning decision to be reached, and the application modified if appropriate.



Site size: 2.9ha

Geology: 2nd Terrace River Gravels

Past Disturbance:

There is no evidence available at this time that suggests that this site has been used for anything other than agriculture from at least the medieval period. Whilst this agricultural activity, and the site's 20th century use as an allotment, may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this damage is unlikely to have been extensive.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

The site lies to the west of the present settlement and away from the core area of Roman and medieval activity. An early Saxon cemetery, together with other finds from the Anglo-Saxon period, point to Anglo-Saxon settlement in and around Bidford, although the focus has not yet been identified. Cropmarks on aerial photographs of this area show as yet undated enclosures, linear features and a probable trackway in the vicinity of this site although none of these are within 200m. Although it is probable that this Proposed Strategic Site was in agricultural use throughout the medieval and later periods, the presence of a number of cropmark sites in the vicinity of the site and its location on the gravel terrace suggests that there is a potential for archaeological deposits predating this agricultural use to survive across this site. Any such deposits are likely to be of regional or local significance.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

The Historic Landscape Character of this site is small rectilinear fields with straight boundaries. Marked on the OS 1955 edition map as allotments.

Sensitivity to change:


The groundworks associated with the proposed residential development of this site would be likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived across this site.

Any development will alter the historic landscape character of this area and have an effect on the surrounding character of small rectilinear fields.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

A programme of archaeological evaluative fieldwork should be undertaken prior to the determination of any application to develop this site. This fieldwork will help to establish the presence or absence of archaeological remains or artefacts across the site, and, if present, their character, extent and state of preservation. It will also provide information useful for identifying potential options for minimising or avoiding damage to them. This fieldwork may identify archaeological deposits of regional or national importance, which may be worthy of preservation in situ. The

availability of this information prior to the determination of any planning application submitted will enable an informed and reasonable planning decision to be reached, and the application modified if appropriate.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

Archaeological finds dating to the prehistoric, Roman, Anglo-Saxon, medieval and post-medieval periods have been recovered from the immediate vicinity of this site. In particular, a significant number of Anglo-Saxon finds, including coins, have been recovered less than 200m to the south-east of this site. The concentration of finds recovered from that area suggests the presence of an Anglo-Saxon site, perhaps a market or 'productive' site, in the area. This is the only potential 'productive' site identified in Warwickshire. The precise focus of this activity, and the earlier settlement associated with the known early Saxon cemetery which lies to the south-west of this site, has yet to be identified. Although it is probable that this Proposed Strategic Site was in agricultural use throughout the medieval and later periods, the recovery of a number of pre-medieval finds from the area suggests that there is a potential for archaeological deposits predating this agricultural use to survive across this site. Any such deposits are likely to be of regional or local significance.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

A modern farm complex occupies this site. Prior to this post-1955 development, the Historic Landscape Character of this area was small rectilinear fields with straight and curvilinear boundaries.


Sensitivity to change:

The groundworks associated with the proposed business development of this site would be likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived across this site.

The historic landscape character for this area has already changed significantly in the last century. The development of this site would not, therefore, have a significant impact upon the HLC of this area.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Archaeological fieldwork will be necessary to mitigate any archaeological impact of any development across this site. The first phase of fieldwork required would be a programme of evaluative fieldwork in order to establish the presence or absence of archaeological remains across the site, and, if present, their character, extent and state of preservation. This will inform the development of a strategy, if appropriate, to mitigate the archaeological impact of the proposed development. This strategy may include further archaeological fieldwork. This evaluative fieldwork could be secured by a condition upon planning consent. The extent of the fieldwork required will be dependant upon the nature and extent of the development.



Site size: 11.5ha

Geology: Clay

Past Disturbance:

Prior to the construction of the school across the southern part of this site during the mid 20th century it is probable that this site was in agricultural use from at least the medieval period. Whilst this agricultural activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating this use, this activity is unlikely to have caused extensive damage. However, the 19th century fieldscape indicates that this was an area of open fields during the medieval period. No trace of the ridge and furrow associated with this survives and although it may have had some adverse impact upon pre-medieval deposits, the survival of a prehistoric cropmark indicates that any surviving deposits may still be in a reasonable state of preservation.

The construction of the school buildings and any associated hard landscaping is likely to have had a negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived across the southern part of this site. The extent of this impact will have been dependent upon the groundworks associated with the construction works, e.g. building foundation design, extent of

landscaping, services etc, information on which is not presently available; however, this impact is likely to have been extensive across parts of this area.

Outside of the main school building complex, the central part of this site has been used as a sports ground. Provided the construction of the pitches has not involved significant terracing to provide a level playing field, it is unlikely that the use of this area as a sports field would have had an extensive impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived across this area.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

A ring ditch, which is likely to date to the prehistoric period, is visible within the development site on aerial cropmarks of this area. Although the agricultural use of this site is likely to have partly disturbed this site, it is unlikely that this would have resulted in extensive damage to this feature or to other, as yet undetected, features. A Roman settlement also lies to the south-east of the development site. It is probable that the PSS was in agricultural use throughout the medieval and later periods. In addition to the known ring ditch which is known to survive across this site, there is a potential for further, previously unknown, archaeological deposits, either associated with, or unrelated to, the ring ditch, to survive across this site. Any such features are likely to date to pre-date the medieval and later agricultural use of this site, and to be of regional or local significance.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

The current character of the larger area to the east is associated with the post-1955 construction of a school across this site. The Historic Landscape Character of this area prior to the construction of the school was large irregular fields with curvilinear and straight boundaries with some dog-leg and reverse 'S' boundaries, probably formed from 16th – 18th century piecemeal enclosure . The reverse 'S' and dog-leg boundaries suggest that at one time this area probably formed medieval open fields. The character of the smaller area to the north west consists of a small rectilinear field with straight and curvilinear boundaries, which may be a remnant of 16th-18th century piecemeal enclosure.


Sensitivity to change:

While the previous construction of a school across this site will have resulted in some localised extensive disturbance to any archaeological deposits which previously survived across the southern part of the site, there is a significant potential for well preserved deposits to have survived across the remainder of the site. The proposed construction of housing and a replacement school across this area would be likely to have a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological features which survive across this site.

The historic landscape character for this area has already changed significantly in the last century. The development of this site would not, therefore, have a significant impact upon the HLC of this area.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Further archaeological assessment, the first phase of which would comprise detailed desk-based assessment, should be undertaken of this entire site. Archaeological evaluative fieldwork should be undertaken prior to the determination of any application to redevelop any parts of this site outside of the main area of school buildings. This fieldwork will help to establish the presence or absence of archaeological remains or artefacts across the site, and, if present, their character, extent and state of preservation. This fieldwork will also provide information useful for identifying potential options for minimising or avoiding damage to them. This fieldwork may identify archaeological deposits of regional or national importance, which may be worthy of preservation in situ. The availability of this information prior to the determination of any planning application submitted will enable an informed and reasonable planning decision to be reached, and the application modified if appropriate. Given the potential for significant archaeological disturbance to have already occurred across the area presently occupied by school buildings, it would not be appropriate to require pre-determination evaluation across this part of the site. As there is a potential for some archaeological deposits to have survived across this area despite this past disturbance, it would be appropriate to a programme of archaeological fieldwork to be undertaken to mitigate the impact of the redevelopment of this area across this area; however, this could be secured by a condition upon any planning consent granted for this part of the site. The extent of the fieldwork required across this area would be dependent upon the nature and extent of the groundworks associated with the redevelopment of this area, and the results of further assessment of the past disturbance of this area.



Site size: 5.4ha

Geology: Clay

Past Disturbance:

Prior to the factory development of this site in the mid 20th century it is probable that the majority of this site was in agricultural use from at least the medieval period. The mid 20th century and later development of this site is likely to have had a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived across this site. The extent of this impact will have been dependent upon the groundworks associated with the construction works, e.g. building foundation design, extent of landscaping, services etc, and the nature of any such archaeological deposits, information on either of which is not presently available. Modern aerial photographs of this site show extensive planting around the main factory buildings, and the excavation of what appears to have been a large pond. The construction of a pond is likely to have removed any archaeological deposits across its footprint, and the planting could have resulted in significant damage to any archaeological deposits previously surviving across this area. Elsewhere across the site it is probable that any archaeological disturbance would have been greatest in the areas of the foundations of any existing, or previously

existing, buildings. There may, however, have been less groundworks undertaken across the areas between the buildings, under the floors of the larger factory buildings, and across those areas used for parking etc. While it is likely that the previous factory development will have had a significant negative archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits previously present across the site, the full extent of this impact is presently not known, and there is a potential for 'pockets' of well preserved archaeological deposits to survive outside the main areas of ground disturbance.


Sensitivity to change:

While it is likely that some aspects of the previous development of this site would have had a significant impact upon, or completely removed, any archaeological deposits previously present across the site, there is a potential for archaeological deposits to have survived at varying levels of preservation across the remainder of the site. It is probable that the proposed redevelopment of this site would have a significant impact upon any archaeological deposits which still survive across it. The extent of this impact would be dependent upon the groundworks associated with the proposed development.

The historic landscape character for this area has already changed significantly in the last century. With the exception of the small area of ridge and furrow which would be lost, the development of this site would not have a significant impact upon the HLC of this area.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Further archaeological assessment, in the form of a detailed desk-based assessment and walkover survey, should be undertaken of this site. A report detailing the results of this assessment should be submitted with any application to redevelop this site. Dependent upon the conclusions of the desk-based assessment regarding the previous ground disturbance across this site, and the nature and extent of the proposed development (including landscaping), further fieldwork may be necessary across those areas of the site which have not been subject to extensive past disturbance. This further fieldwork could be secured by a condition upon planning consent.





Archaeological potential of the PSS:

It is probable that this proposed site was in agricultural use throughout the medieval and later periods. A Civil War skirmish, which took place on August 23rd, 1642, is known to have been fought within the area between Southam and Bascote. The exact location of the skirmish site is presently unknown, however, there is a potential that the engagement extended over this site. Evidence for this skirmish would take the form of artefact scatters within the topsoil, the study of which can provide further information about the battle. The information obtained from any such artefact scatters about the battle, and the artefacts themselves, could be of potential regional significance. Although a single prehistoric flint has been previously recovered from this site, few archaeological sites have been previously recorded in the immediate vicinity. Evidence for prehistoric and Roman activity has, however, been recorded from the wider area. The absence of known archaeological sites from the immediate vicinity of this site may be due to a lack of previous archaeological investigations across this area, rather than an absence of activity during the premedieval periods. There is therefore a potential for previously unknown archaeological deposits, pre-dating the medieval agricultural use of this site, to survive across this area. Any such archaeological deposits are likely to be of regional or local significance.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

This site consists of small rectilinear and irregular fields with straight boundaries. These fields may have been formed as a result of piecemeal enclosure (16th-18th century). Excellent ridge and furrow survival in these fields shows how this area once formed medieval open fields; this area, along with part of SOU.1, is the best surviving example of ridge and furrow in the immediate vicinity of Southam.

Sensitivity to change:


The groundworks associated with the proposed construction of dwellings across this site, and any associated landscaping etc, is likely to have a significant negative impact upon any archaeological deposits present across this site. Any groundworks across this site would cause significant disturbance to any artefact scatters associated with the Civil War skirmish at Southam.

Any development will significantly alter the historic landscape character of this area and have an effect on the surrounding character. The development of this area would also result in the destruction of some of the best surviving ridge and furrow in this area.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

A programme of archaeological evaluative fieldwork should be undertaken prior to the determination of any application to develop this site. This fieldwork will help to establish the presence or absence of archaeological remains or artefacts across the site, and, if present, their character, extent and state of preservation. It will also provide information useful for identifying potential options for minimising or avoiding damage to them. This fieldwork may identify archaeological deposits of regional or national importance, which may be worthy of preservation in situ. The availability of this information prior to the determination of any planning application submitted will enable an informed and reasonable planning decision to be reached, and the application modified if appropriate.

Past Disturbance:

The Greenwood Map of 1822 indicates that the southern part of the proposed development site was built upon by the earlier 19th century, and the 1st Ed. OS map of 1886 shows further development, including a needle factory, across this area. These buildings may have disturbed any earlier archaeological deposits present across this part of site.

Prior to the development of this site in the mid 20th century it is probable that the majority of the rest of this site was in agricultural use from at least the medieval period. The mid 20th century and later development of this site is likely to have had a significant archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived across this site. The extent of this impact will have been dependent upon the groundworks associated with the construction works and the nature of the archaeological deposits. Information on the groundworks associated with this development (e.g. building foundation design, extent of landscaping, services etc) is

not presently available, however, it is probable that the groundworks would have been greatest across the footprints of any existing, or previously existing, buildings. There may, however, have been less disturbance in the areas between the buildings, and across those areas used for parking etc. While it is likely that the previous factory development will have had a significant archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits previously present across the site, the full extent of this impact is presently not known, and there is a potential for 'pockets' of well preserved archaeological deposits to survive outside the main areas of ground disturbance.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

The majority of the road which forms the eastern boundary of this site follows the line of the Roman road Ryknild Street. It is possible that the modern road diverts east from the original Roman route, with the original Roman road continuing across the site. There is a potential for archaeological deposits associated with this routeway, including roadside settlement, to survive across this site. Any such deposits across the site are likely to date from the Roman period onwards, and to be of regional or local significance. Greenwood's map of 1822 indicates that the

southern part of the proposed development site was built upon by the earlier 19th century, and the 1st Ed. OS map of 1886 shows further development across this area. It is possible that this is a continuation of an earlier occupation of this site, and that archaeological deposits associated with the medieval and later development of Studley survive across this area, though, if so, it is likely they would have been disturbed by the later development of this site. Any such deposits are likely to be of local importance. A needle factory is shown fronting Redditch Road in the south of the site on the 1:2500 County Series OS map of 1905. It is possible that this is the same building, but extended, shown on the 1st Ed. OS map of 1886. Parts of this factory may still be extant. There is the potential for archaeological deposits associated with this post-medieval industrial activity to survive across this site. Any such deposits are likely to be of local interest.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

The current landscape character of this site is industrial. Prior to the modern, post-1955, development of this site the landscape character of the majority of the site was small rectilinear fields with straight and curvilinear boundaries, however, parts of this site have been in industrial use since at least the later 19th century.

Sensitivity to change:


While it is likely that some aspects of the previous development of this site would have had a significant impact upon, or completely removed, any archaeological deposits previously present across the site, there is a potential for archaeological deposits to have survived at varying levels of preservation across the remainder of the site. It is probable that the proposed redevelopment of this site would have a significant impact upon any archaeological deposits which still survive across it. The extent of this impact would be dependent upon the groundworks associated with the proposed development.

The historic landscape character of this area has already changed significantly in the last century. Some of the historic industrial character of this site could be maintained by the retention, if appropriate, of any extant buildings associated with the earlier industrial use of this site.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Given the past disturbance of the site, preservation in situ of below ground archaeological deposits is not an issue and pre-determinative evaluation would not be sought. However, further assessment of the site, including the needle factories, and any consequent investigation, would be sought via an appropriate planning condition. The extent of the fieldwork required will be dependent upon the nature and extent of the development, for example, it may be appropriate to undertake evaluative fieldwork across those areas which have been subject to less previous disturbance and the archaeological potential higher.

The subsequent use of this area as a plant nursery may have had a more extensive impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived across this site, for example through deep digging, however, the extent of the impact associated within this use is not presently known.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

A cropmark complex, which includes an enclosure and linear features, and a possible trackway are visible on aerial photographs c.170m to the south-east of this site. These features are presently undated but on morphological grounds are likely to date to the prehistoric or Roman periods. There is a potential for archaeological features related to these known sites, and other previously unknown sites, to survive across this proposed development site. Any such features are likely to be of regional or local importance, however, there is a potential for nationally important deposits to survive across this site.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

The Historic Landscape Character of this area is small rectilinear fields with straight boundaries, probably formed as a result of planned enclosure (18th 19th century). The field to the south of Walton Road once formed part of Redhill Nurseries but now appears to be scrub.

Sensitivity to change:


There is a significant potential for well-preserved archaeological deposits to be present across this site. The proposed construction of dwellings across this site, and any associated landscaping etc, is likely to have a significant negative impact upon any archaeological deposits present across this site.

Any development will alter the historic landscape character of this area and have an effect on the surrounding character.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

A programme of archaeological evaluative fieldwork should be undertaken prior to the determination of any application to develop this site. This fieldwork will help to establish the presence or absence of archaeological remains or artefacts across the site, and, if present, their character, extent and state of preservation. It will also provide information useful for identifying potential options for minimising or avoiding damage to them. The availability of this information prior to the determination of any planning application submitted will enable an informed and reasonable planning decision to be reached, and the application modified if appropriate. Past Disturbance:

Part of the site WEL.2 (to the north-east) is occupied by a quarry on the 1st Ed. OS mapping of 1886. While it is probable that this map shows the full extent of this quarry, there is a potential for quarrying to have extended elsewhere across the site. Any quarrying is likely to have removed any archaeological deposits which previously survived across the footprint of the quarry.

It is probable that this site was in agricultural use between at least the medieval period and the construction of the Horticulture Research International (HRI) complex in the mid-20th century. Whilst this activity may have caused some damage to any archaeological deposits predating, or associated with this use, this activity is unlikely to have caused extensive damage. There is therefore a potential for well-preserved archaeological deposits to survive across those areas which have not been subject to disturbance associated with the development of the HRI (including landscaping) and the area of quarrying referred to above.

The construction of the HRI, and any associated landscaping, is likely to have had a significant archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits which previously survived across this site. The extent of this impact will have been dependent upon the groundworks associated with the construction works and the nature of the archaeological deposits. Information on the groundworks associated with the HRI development (e.g. building foundation design, extent of landscaping, services etc) is not presently available, however, it is probable that the groundworks would have been greatest across the footprints of the HRI buildings. There may, however, have been less groundworks undertaken across the areas between the buildings, and across those areas used for parking etc. While it is likely that the HRI development will have had a significant archaeological impact upon any archaeological deposits previously present across the site, the full extent of this impact is presently not known, and there is a potential for 'pockets' of well preserved archaeological deposits to survive outside the main areas of ground disturbance.

Archaeological potential of the PSS:

Archaeological finds dating to the prehistoric periods have been recovered from this site and the surrounding area, and cropmarks on aerial photographs show further archaeological features, including enclosures, linear features, a bowl barrow and a cursus in the vicinity of this proposed development site. The national importance of the cursus and bowl barrow cropmark complex, which lies 330m to the south-west of this site, is recognised by its statutory protection as a Scheduled Monument. A Roman rural settlement has also been excavated to the north-west of the site. There is therefore a potential for archaeological features related to these

known sites, and other previously unknown sites, to survive across the Proposed Strategic Site. As this site was likely to have been in agricultural use from at least the medieval period, any archaeological features present across the site are likely to predate the medieval period. Any such archaeological deposits are likely to be of regional or local importance.

Historic Landscape Character of the PSS:

Despite the development of the Horticulture Research International complex in the later 20th century, the field pattern of small and medium sized rectilinear fields with straight boundaries which was probably formed as a result of planned 18th/19th century enclosure, has remained relatively unchanged and is still recognisable in this area.

Sensitivity to change:

While it is likely that some aspects of the previous development of this site would have had a significant impact upon, or completely removed, any archaeological deposits previously present across the site, there is a potential for archaeological deposits to have survived at varying levels of preservation across the remainder of the site. It is probable that the proposed redevelopment of this site would have a significant impact upon any archaeological deposits which still survive across it. The extent of this impact would be dependent upon the groundworks associated with the proposed development.

Despite the development of the HRI the 18th/19th century field pattern has been relatively unchanged and is still recognisable in this area; it may be possible for the design of the development to reflect this.

Archaeological Planning Recommendation for the PSS:

Further archaeological assessment, in the form of a detailed desk-based assessment and walkover survey, should be undertaken of this site. This will help to establish the extent of the past ground disturbance across this site, which will enable a better understanding of the likelihood of archaeological deposits having survived the previous site disturbance. A report detailing the results of this assessment should be submitted with any application to redevelop this site. Further evaluative fieldwork is likely to be required across those areas of the site which have not been subject to extensive past disturbance. Dependent upon the conclusions of the desk-based assessment regarding the previous ground disturbance across this site, and the nature and extent of the proposed development (including landscaping), it may be appropriate to secure this further fieldwork by a condition upon planning consent.




