**Form A2 – Details of Plan/ Strategy/ Service/ Policy**

**Stage 1 – Scoping and Defining**

(1) What are the aims and objectives of Plan/Strategy/Service/Policy?

Neighbourhood Development Plans are one of a set of community rights brought in by the Localism Act in 2011. Neighbourhood Plans are planning documents which, when 'made' (adopted) by the District Council will become part of the Development Plan for the area, alongside the Core Strategy. The Stratford-upon-Avon Neighbourhood Development Plan (SUANDP) covers the Parish area of Stratford-upon-Avon. Policies included within the Plan will affect the people who live, work and visit the Parish. The Vision Statement for the SUANDP covers the following points:

1. Stratford-upon-Avon will still be instantly recognisable as an historic market town in a beautiful riverside setting. It will have absorbed the additional housing required by SDC but retained its charm and individuality; the historic core will have been sympathetically enhanced and run down areas redeveloped;
2. For residents the town will be liveable: compact, walkable, attractive with good public spaces, culture, a strong local economy and housing choice;
3. Stratford-upon-Avon will also continue to act as a centre for the surrounding area for shops, services and jobs;
4. The town will be much better at accommodating and managing visitors;
5. There will have been an integrated approach to investment in infrastructure and transport, traffic will be less intrusive, and congestion will have been reduced and managed effectively;
6. Tiddington and Alveston will have retained their separate identities; and
7. The Neighbourhood Area will be greener with the addition of appropriate landscaping; green corridors linking up the built-up areas to the adjacent countryside, and appropriate blue infrastructure which can restore and enhance waterways and sustainably manage water.

<p>(2) How does it fit with Stratford District Council's wider objectives?</p>	<p>The SUANDP is consistent with wider objectives contained in the District Council's Sustainable Community Strategy, Housing Strategy, Business and Enterprise Strategy and the adopted Core Strategy.</p>
<p>(3) What are the expected outcomes?</p>	<p>The expected outcomes of the SUANDP are set out in the Vision Statement and associated Strategic Objectives and more specifically within a large number of the individual policies and linked projects.</p>

(see form A1 for list of protected groups)</p>	<p>The SUANDP is not intended to benefit any one particular group. It is relevant to everyone who will live, work or visits the District over the plan period to some degree.</p>
<p><b><u>Stage 2 - Information Gathering</u></b></p>	
<p>(1) What type and range of evidence or information have you used to help you make a judgement about the plan/ strategy/ service/ policy?</p>	<p>The evidence base for assessing the SUANDP is the same as the Core Strategy, which includes primary and secondary information. This includes studies commissioned to establish the level of housing provision and associated issues around affordability and deliverability. Additional local evidence has been gathered to inform individual policies within the Plan. The Strategic Environmental Assessment work carried out in relation to the NDP also included consideration of baseline data and the potential for significant effects on people as well as the environment.</p> <p>The Basic Conditions Statement submitted with the NDP contained a short statement at para 5.6 (p.17) stating that the Plan has had regard to fundamental rights and freedoms guaranteed under the European Convention on Human Rights (ECHR) and that it was fully compliant with the Human Rights Act. The Examiner confirmed that there was nothing in the NDP that led her to conclude there was any breach of the Convention or that the Plan was otherwise incompatible with it.</p>

<p>(2) Have you consulted on the plan/ strategy/ service/policy and if so with whom?</p>	<p>The production of the SUANDP has been an iterative process with community consultation over a number of years central to its production. However, the NDP has also been through two formal consultation processes in accordance with The Neighbourhood Planning (General) Regulations 2012. The first being a 6 week Regulation 14 'Pre-Submission' consultation carried out by the Town Council as 'Qualifying Body'. The second 6 week consultation was the Regulation 16 'Formal Submission' consultation carried out by the Local Planning Authority.</p> <p>Groups consulted on the NDP at both consultation stages included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Local businesses</li> <li>• Local residents</li> <li>• Community groups</li> <li>• 'Statutory' consultees listed in the Regulations, including Historic England; Environment Agency and Natural England</li> </ul>		
<p>(3) Which of the groups with protected characteristics have you consulted with?</p>	<p>The consultations set out above were open to all interested parties. The District Council has a database of individuals and organisations that it contacts to inform them of the commencement of consultations. Any individual or group may be placed on the database. This database was shared with the Town Council for the Regulation 14 consultation, for consistency. The only group with protected characteristics that was specifically consulted was Accessible Stratford, in relation to issues of disability.</p>
