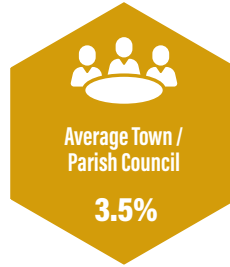
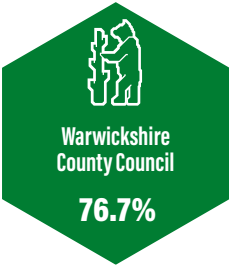

A message from Councillor Susan Juned

Leader, Stratford-on-Avon District Council

Stratford-on-Avon District Council has a Council Plan, and this has, once again, formed the context for this year's budget. The key priorities in the Plan are:

- Residents and communities
- The delivery of services
- Addressing climate change and nature recovery
- Health and wellbeing
- Affordable housing
- Local economy.

The Council is funded from three main sources: central government grants; the money that comes from council tax receipts and service charges; and a proportion of business rates.

This year, for the first time in a decade, a multi-year settlement was announced which has brought some certainty and the ability to plan. But the funding for future year's will be a challenge. Government is making it clear that they expect that a greater proportion of council funding should come from council tax.

Despite this, the District Council remains a low-taxing council – ranked 18/164 amongst District Councils for 2025/26.

Councils and councillors have to balance their ambitions for improved services with meeting short-term needs and preparing sustainable long-term plans. We also have to listen to the priorities of our residents whilst meeting our legal obligations.

In this year's budget we are continuing our commitment to ensuring that a cost of living fund is available to assist vulnerable residents and families. We are also ensuring that there is support to tackle rural crime prevention work and to support work with young people. We are also supporting VASA with their volunteer driver scheme.

The need to provide affordable housing remains high on our agenda as is the priority to tackle energy efficiency, climate change and nature depletion. An investment into solar panels and batteries will reduce energy costs with plans to also improve electric vehicle charging points.

We also are continuing with our support for local businesses and tackling the pressures that have arisen from the Government requirements for more housing development.

All councils are experiencing financial pressure. Inflation, higher costs and delivery charges and increased demands for services has an impact on budgets, but it is our task to develop robust plans – not only in terms of financial resilience but also in finding ways to reinvent and transform the way local services are delivered to better serve our communities.

Moving forward, central Government has made it clear it wishes to see the end of two-tier working in Local Government. If the timetable is met, this District Council will no longer exist by 2028. We have a clear preference for a south Warwickshire unitary option and have made that clear to Government. We now have to develop that vision for that Council of the future and be prepared to adapt to change whilst continuing the services that are expected of us.

Smaller, more localised councils are more responsive to the unique needs of communities and businesses in each town and village. This makes it much easier to boost growth, build affordable homes and deliver tailored preventative services that improve health and reduce pressure on the NHS. It's not being super-sized that makes a council high performing or financially stable – it's years of hard work by dedicated public servants with clear leadership.

In the next year we also have to work on the strategic authority we wish to be a part of and begin plans for the transition arrangements that will be required to bring together the services that are currently spread between the County and the District Council.

I hope that you will join with me in developing the vision for the Council of the future and helping us to adapt to change, whilst continuing to protect priority frontline services, make council assets work harder and work with our excellent staff to deliver improved service.

Launched a new Community Grant Scheme marking the 80th anniversary of VE/VJ Days to improve local facilities.

Completed the major refurbishment of Stratford Recreation Ground, delivering 75+ inclusive features.

Managed CIL allocations and supported 15 infrastructure projects

Approved installation of new EV charge points in Council car parks.

Progressing towards full recycling and food waste services for all communal properties.

Allocated Year 4 UKSPF “communities” funding to key projects including parenting support, domestic abuse services, rural crime advisors, warmer homes, public safety measures, high street revitalisation, and a new Stratford town website.

Embedded social value requirements in all Council contracts to boost local employment.

Continued six monthly Town & Parish Council Forum cycle and strengthened community engagement through the Liaison Officer.

Delivered event safety training for Town and Parish Councils.



This year's budget supports vulnerable residents and progresses key strategic and environmental objectives, while ensuring investment is targeted where demand is rising most.

Here are some of the items the budget will fund this year:

Major Projects

Gateway Clearance and Development – £1,500,000 (one off) Funds site clearance and temporary car parking works to avoid ongoing business rates.

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) Capacity – £1,000,000 (one off) Temporary staffing for Legal, Finance and HR to meet increased workload once the LGR timetable is set.

Housing to Rent – £1,000,000 (one off) To secure additional social housing units and reduce reliance on costly temporary accommodation.

High Street Pedestrianisation – £326,000 (one off) Proposed 12 month pedestrianisation scheme (previous 2025/26 pilot unable to proceed).

Climate, Environment and Planning

Climate Change Fund – £500,000 (one off) Fifth consecutive year of funding for local climate initiatives.

Biodiversity Net Gain – £31,000 (ongoing) To meet statutory Biodiversity Net Gain reporting duties.

Neighbourhood Development Plans – £100,000 (over 3 years) To support parish councils in developing NDPs, enabling the completion of 10 each year.

Community Wellbeing and Social Support

South Warwickshire Place Partnership Board – £20,000 (one off) To deliver local health inequality priorities.

Upper Lighthorne Parenting Project – £20,000 (one off) Supports wellbeing work with families and schools.

VASA Volunteer Driver Scheme – £12,000 (for 3 years) Supports transport for older and mobility impaired residents.

Veterans Healthcare and Development Officer – £8,000 (for 2 years) Contribution to veterans support services.

Communities and Social Inclusion Enabler – £24,000 (2026/27), then £59,000 ongoing Continues work on social exclusion and community cohesion.

Youth Work Catalyst Project – £41,000 (over 3 years) Supports youth engagement and anti-social behaviour work.

Cost of Living Crisis Mitigation Fund – £250,000 (one off) Adds to projected £250,000 rollover to create a £500,000 hardship support fund.

Other

Shakespeare's England – £25,000 (over 2 years) To continue support until new arrangements are confirmed.

Extension of Natural Play Cycle Area – £150,000 (one off) Expands well used cycle play area.

Refurbishment of Shottery Fields Play Equipment – £100,000 (one off) Replaces ageing equipment and improves inclusivity.

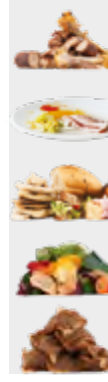

A Year in Recycling Contamination

Did you know that it currently costs Stratford-on-Avon District Council around **£300k per year** to remove contamination from kerbside recycling?

The Environmental and Operational Services Team are making it their mission to reduce contamination throughout 2026.

The composition of an average, blue-lidded recycling bin in 2025 was as follows:



The Year's Statistics:

Around 42 tonnes of food waste incorrectly went into the recycling bin and around 1,662 tonnes was non-recyclable waste, such as textiles, sanitary waste/nappies, construction waste, clinical waste and liquids!

Around 10,588 tonnes was pure recyclable material.

Your council tax explained

Your council tax is a local property tax that is charged in order to supplement Government funding of the local services provided by public authorities. The amount of council tax you pay is dependent upon which band your property is in. In addition Warwickshire County Council, Warwickshire Police and Town and Parish Councils are able to levy their own charge or precept.

The amount of the precept varies between each Town or Parish Council and is added to your council tax. Information on Warwickshire County Council's and Warwickshire Police's element of council tax can be viewed on their websites.
